
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Fellow Journeyers,

Acts 2:1-13

This is an incredible day. It's what Christians call the birthday of the Church. This is the day that the disciples did what they were not prepared to do: They shared the Gospel in a way that brought thousands of people into faith in Jesus as the Messiah and a journey that would lead them all into the heart of God, forever.

Notice that as the Spirit of God filled them, they were able to speak in languages they had never studied. When God moves in, all things are possible.

Today is the beginning of your newest commitment: to let God work through you in ways in which you could never prepare. Who could really prepare to tell the story of God in Jesus the Christ in a way that makes total sense and would be convincing to people around the world? And yet, God used those very kind of people that day. And God can and will use you. Just let God work through you. Fell the Holy Spirit with you today and every day/night. And let the glory of God in Christ work through you. Don't worry about being prepared. God's Holy Spirit can do anything in and through

Where else would we start, but at the very beginning: Genesis.

"In the beginning, God created..." The first five words of the entire Biblical text set the main theme: God created, this is God's world, we are God's creations. So, to whom else would we cry out, "Mayday, mayday!"

One of the parts of the creation story that I love the most is the image of God walking and talking with Eve and Adam in the Garden. The relationship was so close that the humans were naked before God and not embarrassed or afraid. When I think metaphorically, I realize that what the writers were trying to say was that the humans could and did bare it all before God, and there was no shame, no embarrassment, no distance. There was nothing to hide. God came so close to them that they could walk and talk with God, the great Creator of the Universe.

How much God must love those God made in God's image. How much God must still love us, and all. How amazing that God would be willing to come so close to us.

As you take your first step in this Journey to Pentecost, I invite you to bare it all before God (though the rest of us don't need to see everything), and know that God is willing to walk and talk with you every step of the way. (Something they learned on the Way to Emmaus).



May 2

During the Exodus, the people wandered through the desert of the Sinai Peninsula for 40 years. But they were never lost, not for one day, not in any direction.

God was in their midst in the form of a pillar of cloud by day, fire by night. When the pillar moved, so did the people. Where the pillar moved, the people followed. God was always leading them, always in their presence. And yet, they still kept asking for a sign that God was with them.

Oh how we still do the same!

Now, take time to pray to God. Apologize for forgetting, for always asking for more, for not following, and give God thanks for the ways God has always been with you in your life. Today is the first Sunday of the month, a day our congregation always gathers to celebrate the Sacrament of Communion. And we will, online! Make sure to have your elements ready if you are able to worship with us online.

May 3

A Sacrament is an act in which we participate to celebrate the Grace of God that is directly conveyed in that act. We experience God's grace as Jesus' life was broken and spilled out on our behalf.

Jesus had gathered with his disciples in what we call the Last Supper (which we know of as the First Communion) to honor the Passover meal, the time when God freed the Israelites from enslavement in Egypt. Grace frees us... from the bondage of sin and opens us into a deeper relationship with God. As Jesus gathered for the meal that they all had been a part of their whole lives, Jesus took the bread and the wine and symbolically made their meaning even deeper than before. That's what Jesus always did. He took things that the people were used to and gave them deeper meaning.

Every table, every meal, is to be a reminder of the Communion Table, where God brings us all together and unites us as God's children, welcome at the Table of Christ.

Allow every table (even if it's a TV tray or sidearm of the couch) to be sacred space. Imagine sitting with God at the Lord's Table, and let the act of eating feed not just your body, but your soul. Let every meal take you deeper into your faith that teaches you that God is always with us, always providing what we need for life, both here and forever in heaven.

Today begins the Jewish festival of Shavuot. It commemorates the time when the Israelites were given the Torah, the Ten Commandments in the Exodus Experience.

The Commandments, not suggestions, were a way not so much for God to control the people, but more for the people to orient their lives together to honor God by having a very specific way of living.

Later in the story of God, Jesus was asked which was the greatest? Surprisingly, he didn't quote any of the ten. Instead he dug into Deuteronomy 6 and expanded it:

You shall love the Lord your God with all of your heart, mind, soul, and strength, and your neighbor as yourself.

The Christian faith demands our whole being. It means worshiping, growing in faith, and living the faith not just on Sundays in our worship space but every day/night in our homes, wherever we are.

Take a moment and note what you have learned in this time of "quarantine." How has your faith grown? How does it still need to grow? How will you help make that happen?

May 4

Today, a prayer:

God my Creator,



I need your help. We all need your help. This CoronaVirus is bugging all of us, and in so many ways. Have you led us here? Have you sent this plague? Have you left us here to fend for ourselves? So many sick, so many deaths, so many surviving. It's such a strange mix of reactions. Please Lord, send your Spirit to heal our world.

Thank you for those among us who are caring for us, for our medical personnel of all kinds of jobs. May they have the strength to do not only their job, but the ability to be present with our loved ones when they are sick... giving them comfort not only in body, but also in spirit.

Guide our leaders as they guide us. May they have wisdom beyond their training, insight beyond their vision, and find moments of rest, too.

Thank you for calling us your children. Thank you for calling me your own. Thank you for coming so fully in Jesus that we would know that you do walk this life with us, that you don't just sit on high, that you create life when we encounter death.

Lord, here we are on the Journey to Pentecost, and we need your help to make it there.

Please, Help us.

In the name of Jesus our Savior, AMEN.

Ezekiel saw some interesting things. You'll find his story in the Old Testament. (Chapter 37) He was led to a valley, overlooked the valley, and discovered the area covered in dry bones. Ezekiel was told to prophesy to the dry bones that they may hear the Word of God. And he did; and they did and the bones stood up filled with the breath of God.

"These bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely." (37:11)

Feel like that lately?

"I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live." (37:14)

And God did; and they did.

When we turn to God, life comes anew. It's not always in the way we expect. It's not always at the time we demand. But it always comes. This is a good time for you to make a commitment to read some Scripture at home, again, or for the first time. I encourage you to read the four Gospels, and to spend some time in the Psalms. See how your faith is like that of those who've gone before us. See how when they turned to God, they found life, and God in it.

See how it led them on a Journey to Pentecost, and join that journey in the Word today. Let God put some flesh onto your dry bones and bring new life to you today as you read the story of God in the Bible.

It's interesting to read the Gospel of Mark and see that the women were told by the angels to go tell the disciples, and (especially) Peter that Jesus had been raised from the dead.

I'm sure Peter felt he had no place among the disciples after denying he even knew Jesus, three times in one night. But Peter, especially, needed to know the Good News.

The Resurrection occurred not just for those who were already believers, but for everyone. And it occurred not just for those who had been faithful, but for those who weren't.

The Resurrection occurred for you!

There is no sin too great that you have committed that would exclude you from the grace that God gives us all from the Resurrection.

Peter was forgiven. So are you.



It's Memorial Day 2020. Give thanks!

Today we honor all those who have given their lives in our country's military service that all may be free.

We can be so humbled knowing that those who have served came from all sorts of backgrounds, faith traditions, orientations, understandings, standards of living, abilities... And yet, they were all united in the hope that there would be "liberty and justice for all." All, not some.

All in our country especially, but also throughout the world. They are folks who opened their lives on behalf of people they didn't know, wouldn't meet, may not have understood the sacrifice they were offering. But they did it anyway.

How blessed we are!

Let us pray:

God of all people, today we thank you especially for those who have served our country so faithfully in the military whose lives were sacrificed in that service. Help us not take our freedom for granted.

And, God, thank you this year for those in the medical and emergency fields who have caught the CoronaVirus from us and have given their lives that we might be well. Help us not take our health for granted.


He has told you, O mortal, what is good; And what does the Lord require of you But to do justice, love kindness, And to walk humbly with your God...

Today, I invite you to give thanks for all the people of faith, who have not only gone before you in your general life, but especially in your Christ Presbyterian Church family. And I invite you to give God thanks for those who are with you even now, over the internet, and when we are able to worship again on the CPC campus. May 23, 2020, is the end of the month of Ramadan in the Islam tradition. They are called to focus, for a month, on their relationship with God, reflect on their lives, and spend quality time with friends and family.

Psalm 139 challenges us to experience God all around us:

"O Lord, you have searched me and known me, You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away. You search out my path and my lying down, And are acquainted with all my ways.

Even before a word is on my tongue, O Lord, You know it completely.
You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me."

Thank you God, for surrounding me completely. I'm sorry that often I don't feel you near, often I complain that you must be far away from me. But you're not. You're in the very air I breathe. Fill each breath with the presence of your Spirit. Let my body take you into me, absorb your Presence fully, so that all I breathe out is about you and the glory of your Presence around and within me.

Nothing separates me from your love in Christ Jesus my Lord and Savior. I need your help remembering and experiencing that more fully, each day, each night, each breath.

Thank you God, for surrounding me completely.

Isaiah 43:1-3a

"But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who forms you, O Israel:

Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; When you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you.

For I am the Lord your God.

Don't test the Lord. People drown; People burn. But Isaiah knows something deeper: God is with us in the storm, our lives belong to God who knows us by name, and God has redeemed us so that we can be with God forever.

When you know that deep down in your heart, mind, and soul, you will find strength to move through every storm in your life with the confidence of God's presence with you. God doesn't always calm the storm, but God always gets you through the storm, faithfully.

John 14:25-27

Jesus reassures his disciples that somehow God is going to keep them connected even after Jesus is gone, "I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

I often think that it must have been so much easier for those original disciples. They had Jesus right in front of them. They saw and experienced so much with him. And then I laugh a bit. They were just as confused. They didn't understand anymore than we do.

So, that's part of why I'm so grateful for the gift of the Holy Spirit in our lives. It's that presence of God that's all around and within us. It's a presence that may not always be visible, but can surely be felt.

In Genesis God walked and talked with those in the Garden. In Jesus God walked and talked with us again. With the Holy Spirit, we are completely surround in God's presence. How blessed we are!

Pray:

You truly are amazing, God. You are the One who knows everything, the One who is beyond our understanding, the One beyond us. And yet, you come so close to us over and over again. Thank you. Please help me be more aware of you in my life every day, every night. AMEN

Acts 1:1-11 This is the day of Ascension. It's traditionally celebrated on the 40th day after Easter. As the Resurrected Jesus was gathered with his followers, they hoped this was the day Jesus would restore the Kingdom to Israel. Instead, this is the day Jesus left them, physically. How sad the followers must have been. Standing and looking up into the sky where Jesus had risen and disappeared, they are scolded by a couple of guys in white robes (angels?) telling them to stop standing there looking up ... waiting for him to return.

I've always thought of this as one of those moments when God says, "Why are you waiting for me to do everything? Get busy and put what I've taught you into practice."

Wasn't Jesus' mom, Mary, amazing! I think of how she was told that she would be pregnant, not with Joseph, but that the Holy Spirit would create a miracle within her. I think of how she was told that he would be destined for greatness, and I think of the greatness she must have seen as he performed miracles, rode into Jerusalem with a great parade, became known as the Anointed One. How exciting!

And I think of how devastated she must have been as she watched him be unjustly tried, beaten, crucified, and buried. How horrible!

Mary's faith is humbling. What she was willing to do for God, what she was willing to give for God, how she was willing to be an instrument of God's plan.... Is nothing short of inspiring.

Pray that your faith is as strong, as humbled, as deep, as willing.



P.S.

Most of us had (have) moms who were really wonderful; some of us had (have) moms who are (were) something completely other. We can learn from both kinds of moms. Your life is yours to live. So choose today, to live yours more like Mary, and whatever example of a mom you have had (have), give thanks for Mary's example.

Isaiah 53

... he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity... he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases.... But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, by his bruises we are healed.



This is one of the prophecies we Christians look back to in order to see Jesus as the Messiah, the anointed one. He didn't win a beauty contest; he won the love contest. Despite human rejection, he continued to love. In the face of his death, he put himself in God's hand and gave us life. He was hurt; we are healed.

Let us pray:

God, how could you still love us, when we cannot fully love you? How could you forgive us when we turned against you?



How could you still be doing that in our lives today? Don't you get tired of our sin? Thank you for being so gracious as to forgive our wrongdoings through the sacrifice of your only begotten— Jesus. In his life, death, and resurrection, we know your love most clearly. We love you, too. And today, we recommit ourselves to following Jesus as he leads us to you. AMEN

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ... What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not over come it."

John 1:1-5

God was in the beginning, God began all things, all life, and brought light to all life. We're all drawn to the light; people of faith are drawn to the Light. In Chapters 5, 6, and 7 of Matthew's Gospel is the famous Sermon on the Mount. In it Jesus really changes the way people think. Luke 24:13-35 tells us of a time following the Resurrection when Jesus appeared to two who were walking to Emmaus. Jesus joins them on their journey, and listens as they recount the story of Jesus' death and reported resurrection. The Scripture tells us that the two didn't know it was Jesus they were talking not just about, but to! As they reached Emmaus, they invited Jesus to stay with them. And in the meal they shared, they recognized that it was Jesus who had been walking and talking with them when he took the bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them.

No one really knows why they didn't recognize him. But don't lose the connection to Jesus' repeated action of the communion which led to them recognizing him. It was in his action that their eyes were opened. It was in his action of loving grace that they recognized him.

In just a few days we will celebrate the Ascension of Jesus, the last time people saw him on Earth. But Jesus is made visible in his followers.... In their loving actions of grace.

How have you blocked others from seeing him in you?

What's one way you could help someone else recognize Jesus in you, today! Don't wait till tomorrow. Today! Write it below:

Jesus and some of his followers were in a boat together. Jesus fell asleep. Suddenly there was a huge storm. The disciples feared for their lives. Jesus was asleep. The boat was being swamped by water from the sea, and Jesus was still sleeping. Wow. That alone is amazing. They wake Jesus up, and he scolds them for having only a little bit of faith. Then, he commands the storm to calm. And it did. Wow!

One of things I love in this story is that according to the order of the story, Jesus didn't get woken up and immediately calm the storm that was capsizing their boat. He took the time to scold the disciples... right in the midst of the storm. Then, he calmed the sea.

It's a reminder to me that God doesn't always act in ways that make sense to me, nor in the timing I would expect, nor... a lot of things.

It reminds me that storms do come, and they do swamp the boat, and God stands in the boat with us while it's sinking, and then saves us.

Because he was able to calm the sea the disciples asked, "What sort of man is this...?"

Because he was in the storm with them and not afraid, I ask, "How can I be more like him?"

And you ask...???

Just think of the people Jesus called as his disciples, his followers, those he would spend the most time with to teach them and shape them into his proclaimers, apostles, who would tell the rest of the world how to come to God through him. They weren't of any real importance, fishermen mostly, and though it was a good job, it didn't really afford them the wonders of life. One was a tax collector. We still know how we feel about them! And it's not favorable. One was a zealot, an over anxious, rebellious, get-behind-whatever-cause-he-finds kind of guy. And yes, some were women, though they don't get the title of disciple so readily. One had survived severe mental-emotional challenges. One was his mom.

None of them were extraordinary. And God worked through them all to

show the world who God is in Jesus the Christ and to invite the whole world into a deeper relationship with God through Jesus as the Christ.

Which, of course, means, God can and does use all of us.

When you don't feel like you know enough about the faith, the Bible, or even yourself, know that God uses people like all of us to call the whole world into faithfulness. When you feel like you just don't know what to say or how to be, know that God will guide you.

Just be you; God can and does use us all, anyone.

Just wait and see what God did with them on Pentecost.

Several Gospels remind us that Jesus said,

Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand.

I'm sure the original hearers understood that meant that Jesus was the One, the representative who would bring God's Kingdom of Heaven to Earth. That's what the people wanted, God to be in charge, God making everything right for them.

But knowing Jesus, there are probably some deeper meanings. I also think Jesus meant to raise their consciousness that they were already surrounded by God's heavenly kingdom, even here on earth. Heaven isn't just a place somewhere out in space. It's not just a place we'll get to, someday. Rob Bell has a new book out, Everything's Spiritual. I suspect he will also remind us that since nothing can separate us from God's love, and that God's Spirit is everywhere, therefore, somehow, we are already in the Kingdom of Heaven. We're just not aware of it. And what if we all were, aware of being in Heaven. Maybe then we'd all help to make it on earth as it is in heaven. Oh what a glorious awakening that would be.



The challenge for you today is to imagine you are helping to show others the very presence of heaven, right here in your life. May it be so.
